Day 1: Fairbanks, Alaska

Our grand Alaska photography adventure begins in Fairbanks, Alaska's "Golden Heart City." Capital of the vast Interior, Fairbanks retains its frontier flavor with pioneer saloons, paddlewheelers and outlying mining camps. Fairbanks is also home to the flagship campus of the University of Alaska system, where the famous Geophysical Institute is headquartered, leading research in the study of permafrost, earthquakes, sea ice and the aurora borealis. Meet your Expedition Leader at a welcome dinner this evening, who offers an orientation to all the photo opportunities to come.

Day 2: Denali National Park—Private Flight to Camp Denali

This morning we drive south through boreal forest along the Nenana River to Denali National Park. At 6 million acres—larger than the state of Massachusetts—Denali is one of the world's great wilderness preserves. The park's namesake is the highest peak in North America, towering 20,310 feet over alpine tundra and taiga that provide habitat for abundant wildlife. The mountain's name—Denali—means "The High One" in the Athabascan language.

Due to an extended road closure in the interior of Denali National Park as a result of a major landslide in 2021, access to the remote backcountry at the end of the 92-mile-long park road is currently possible only by air. At the park entrance, board a chartered bush plane for a spectacular aerial journey over the subarctic landscape to Camp Denali, where we'll have an encounter with profound beauty and silence of wild country on a scale most people will never encounter in their lifetime. As we fly over the tangled veins of glacier-fed rivers, broad valleys and verdant tundra, look for wildlife along the edge of the spruce forest and on the braided gravel river bars—we could see moose, caribou, Dall sheep, grizzlies and occasionally wolves—"Alaska's Big Five." Weather permitting, we'll see the icy flanks of the great mountain en route, too. Once we land, we settle in to our cabins at Camp Denali for a three-night immersion in the Alaska Range wilderness. It's the only accommodation inside the national park with a view of Denali from the premises, and the chance to stay here is a rare experience very few visitors to Alaska get, even before the road was closed.





Days 3 & 4: Wilderness Photography in Denali National Park

With views of the mountain directly from Camp Denali, we enjoy extended time in a setting that has no parallel for photographers, with flexibility to adjust our timing around weather, lighting and wildlife sightings. Photographers know light makes the moment—and remote Camp Denali offers a front-row view on some of the most dynamic lightscapes in the subarctic. Early risers may be rewarded with mirror-calm reflections of Denali from kettle ponds just steps from their cabin. At this hour, alpenglow often sweeps across the Alaska Range, with the mountain's sheer south face glowing in pink and gold. This is the time for long exposures, big glass and patience.

After breakfast, choose from a variety of guided photography outings tailored to interest and skill level. Led by naturalist guides with deep regional knowledge—and tuned to the needs of photographers—these hikes prioritize access to high-elevation vistas, expansive ridgelines, sweeping tundra compositions, and wildlife corridors. Scout the tundra ponds for birdlife, or paddle a canoe on Wonder Lake for the iconic postcard shot of Denali's white hulk rising behind. Expect a slower pace, time to set up for bracketed shots, and ample opportunities to explore everything from wide-angle landscapes to macro details like arctic moss, lichen, and ephemeral wildflowers. Wildlife photographers may encounter caribou, moose, ptarmigan, or even bears—shot from a respectful distance, with time to dial in your settings. Along the way, learn about the natural and cultural history of our environs, including the wildlife that thrives here, the Athabascan people who lived off this land for 10,000 years, and the pioneers who mined for gold in nearby Kantishna at the turn of the 20th century.

Return to the lodge by late afternoon for a photo review, optional editing session, or one-on-one technique coaching. After dinner, consider heading back out—this far north, the golden hour can linger past 10 p.m., and soft twilight may offer one last chance to catch Denali peeking from the clouds.

Day 5: Camp Denali / Private Flight to Park Entrance / Anchorage

After a final morning of activities, depart our wilderness lodge after lunch and fly back to the park entrance. Weather permitting, we'll have more chances for stunning eye-level views of Denali's glaciated slopes. Then we board a spacious mini bus for our journey south across the Alaska Range to Anchorage. Our route climbs above tree line over Broad Pass, then descends to follow the Susitna River through thick stands of birch, balsam poplar, willow and spruce. Eventually, we reach Anchorage on Cook Inlet, backdropped by the glacier-capped peaks of the Chugach Range. With a population of just under 300,000, Anchorage is Alaska's largest city and its primary commerce and transportation hub.





Day 6: Alaska Railroad Dome Car to Seward / Private Fox Island—Kayaking

Rise early today to travel the most scenic section of the historic Alaska Railroad. Built in the early 20th century, the state-owned railroad's mainline is 470 miles long, connecting Seward in the south with Fairbanks up north. From our dome car, enjoy a classic train ride along Turnagain Arm as we look for beluga whales, and keep an eye out for tidal bores that create waves big enough for local surfers to ride! We skirt the ice-clad peaks and lush glacial valleys of the Chugach Range, harboring the northernmost temperate rainforest in North America, then turn south to follow the rail corridor winding through the Kenai Mountains–Turnagain Arm National Heritage Area, a designation that recognizes the area's unique cultural, geographic and historical features. Once we cross Moose Pass, the rail line drops back to the coast, ending at the fishing town and port of Seward on Resurrection Bay.

In Seward's small boat harbor, expect to capture shots of charming sea otters bobbing among the yachts and docks. Here, we board a boat for the voyage to private Fox Island on the edge of Kenai Fjords National Park. Our isolated location, fronting a wild pebble beach backdropped by steep forested mountains, reveals the pristine side of Alaska most visitors miss. The Kenai Fjords region is famed for its sea kayaking, and an optional paddling excursion late this afternoon is likely to reveal some of the area's prolific marine life.

Day 7: Kenai Fjords National Park—Private Wildlife Cruise

Iconic images of Alaska are on display today from our private chartered boat as we explore a marine realm where vestiges of the Ice Age linger. Our small vessel allows us to approach wildlife at close range, and Kenai Fjords National Park provides excellent opportunities for photographing humpback whales, orcas, Dall's porpoise, sea lions, sea otters and puffins. Weave among islands and rocky cliffs where seabirds nest, and zoom in on bald eagles in the treetops. Jagged glaciers wind from the mountain heights to the sea, and we may capture shots of icebergs calving with a crash from a glacier's towering blue face. After our all-day outing, return to our secluded lodge on Fox Island for another night of peace and solitude in the coastal wilderness.





Day 8: Fox Island / Seward / Homer / Odyssey Lodge

After a last morning on serene Fox Island, board our private boat for the return journey up Resurrection Bay to the historic harbor town of Seward. From Seward, we head south on a spectacular drive to Homer. The mountain ranges of the Kenai Peninsula rise one after another, sourcing some of Alaska's richest salmon rivers. Homer is known as "the End of the Road" in Alaska, and we follow it all the way down to the harbor on the Homer Spit. Homer is renowned as the Halibut Fishing Capital of the World, and we may get photos of fishermen unloading their catch—the biggest halibut can be eight feet long and up to 500 pounds! While halibut are one of Alaska's most valuable fisheries, Homer also offers excellent fishing for several salmon species, lingcod and rockfish. At the marina, board a private boat transfer to Odyssey Lodge, a secluded wilderness retreat on China Poot Bay, where we spend the next two nights.

Day 9: Kachemak Bay State Park—Grewingk Glacier Hike

Set out this morning for an all-day hiking and photography adventure in Kachemak Bay State Park. Depart from the beach in front of our lodge on a 20-minute water taxi ride through the island-studded marine realm that's home not only to coveted sport fish but also sea otters, seals, porpoises, sea lions, orcas, whales, bald eagles and puffins. Disembark at the trailhead to Grewingk Glacier, a 13-mile-long river of ice that winds down from the Kenai Mountains. The glacier was named by famed naturalist William Healey Dall in 1880 for Constantin Grewingk, who published a study in German on the geology and volcanism of Alaska. The trail climbs gently but steadily upward through a forest of cottonwoods and Sitka spruce to emerge above tree line onto the alluvial flats marking the glacier's former advance. Eventually, we reach the pristine meltwater lake in front of the glacier, viewing its jagged hulk in the distance. Icebergs float on the surface, and we may get to photograph more of them calving from the glacier's face. Once we return to our lodge, there's time to relax on the deck overlooking the bay before another gourmet dinner featuring fresh Alaskan seafood.





Day 10: Homer / Private Flight to Nat Hab's Alaska Bear Camp

Is it possible to say we've saved the best for last? Well, it all depends on how you weigh the wonders of Alaska, but our bear adventures begin today and will surely be a highlight of your photo safari. After lunch, depart Odyssey Lodge by boat and head back to the mainland. Then it's time to board our chartered flight across Cook Inlet to Nat Hab's Alaska Bear Camp, where we spend two nights. The images you'll capture from our private bush plane on a clear day are stunning as we pass snow-clad volcanoes and glaciers winding down from vast icefields. The terrain below us, where the Aleutian and Alaska ranges meet, comprises some of the world's most critical brown bear habitat. Look for bears in the meadows and along the shoreline as we come in for a landing, taxiing down the beach along Chinitna Bay.

Nat Hab's Alaska Bear Camp is located on a historic homestead, a private inholding of coastal land surrounded by Lake Clark National Park and Preserve. These 4 million protected acres of wilderness are the ancestral homelands of the Dena'ina people, preserving an intact ecosystem at the headwaters of the largest sockeye salmon fishery in the world. Accessible only by plane or boat, Bear Camp offers a total immersion in pristine brown bear habitat. From our comfortable new cabins, we have immediate access to some of the best, most consistent bear viewing and photography opportunities anywhere in Alaska, due to the season-long availability of food. In late spring, protein-rich sedge grass supports rapid growth, and bears are often seen browsing in the meadow behind camp, as well as digging clams from the beach. Accustomed to our non-threatening presence, they see us humans merely as part of the scenery, allowing us to move safely in their midst on guided outings, at times photographing them from just a few yards away.





Day 11: Bear Photography in Lake Clark National Park

There's simply no wildlife encounter to match being at close range among bears in their wild home. Two viewing platforms, one elevated for a territorial view, enable us to capture shots of bears nearby and at a distance. And we often watch them right from camp, surrounded by electrified wires that ensure our safety on site. Against a backdrop of sheer-sided peaks rising above the lush valley floor, the bears are sometimes near enough that we can hear them chewing their food and communicating with one another in woofs, purrs and growls. Alaska's mighty brown bears—the coastal version of the interior grizzly bear (which is the same species, *Ursus arctos*)—are the largest land predators in North America. Adult males can weigh up to 1,500 pounds!

While the bear activity we are able to photograph varies according to seasonal and weather conditions, there's always something interesting going on. And while bears are usually plentiful right in the vicinity of camp, we also go into adjacent Lake Clark National Park for added variety. At every turn, we explore the area in the careful company of our seasoned bear naturalists who offer thorough coaching in respectful "bear etiquette," as well as sensitive photography approaches. Our low-impact presence ensures that we never disturb the bears, and they in turn grant us comfortable access to photograph them as they go about their daily routines. After each exciting day, gather in the dining tent for dinner. Fresh local fare is always on the menu, including wild-caught Alaskan salmon.

Day 12: Bear Photography / Private Flight to Homer

We have one last chance this morning to seek photos of bears, admiring their majesty and whimsy alike. Few nature photographers have such an encounter with the raw beauty and profound silence of a landscape this size—these things alone would make for a life-transforming experience. But the chance to watch Alaskan brown bears, incomparable icons of the wild, on their turf, their terms...it's a wonder to have bears welcome us into their world. We depart as ambassadors for the bears, our time among them leaving an indelible mark on us, inspiring us to do all we can to protect them. After lunch, it's time to leave Bear Camp behind as we board our chartered bush plane to return to Homer, where we spend our final night at the tip of the spit. There may be time to stroll the beach, capture a few more trophy halibut photos at the harbor, or wander the shops and galleries nearby, before our farewell dinner in view of Kachemak Bay.

Our Alaska photography adventure comes to a close today as we transfer to the Homer airport for departing flights.

The trail climbs gently but steadily upward through a forest of cottonwoods and Sitka spruce to emerge above tree line onto the alluvial flats marking the glacier's former advance. Eventually, we reach the pristine meltwater lake in front of the glacier, viewing its jagged hulk in the distance. Icebergs float on the surface, and we may get to photograph more of them calving from the glacier's face. Once we return to our lodge, there's time to relax on the deck overlooking the bay before another gourmet dinner featuring fresh Alaskan seafood.

Day 10: Homer / Fly to King Salmon

Is it possible to say we've saved the best for last? Well, it all depends on how you weigh the wonders of Alaska, but our bear adventures begin today and will surely be a highlight of your photo safari. After lunch, depart Odyssey Lodge by boat and head back to the mainland. Then we board a chartered flight from Homer across Cook Inlet to King Salmon at the head of the Alaska Peninsula, then transfer to our classic Alaskan lodge on the Naknek River. This cozy wood-beamed lodge offers a comfortable base for wilderness bear viewing in nearby Katmai National Park. Once we get settled in, reconvene for a presentation by our Expedition Leader on bear biology and behavior, to prepare us for the adventures ahead tomorrow. This evening, enjoy a fine dinner featuring Alaskan specialties in the lodge dining room.





Day 11: King Salmon / Katmai National Park—Bear Photography on the Brooks River

After breakfast, depart early for the nearby floatplane base where we board our short flight to Katmai National Park. Here, we have access to world-renowned Brooks Falls, one of the best places to photograph brown bears in their natural habitat. Katmai is home to the world's largest population of these enormous omnivores, with some 2,200 individuals inside the park. As many bear populations around the world decline, Katmai's 4 million acres of wilderness provides some of the last pristine habitat to sustain them.

Within Katmai's protected bounds, bears live largely undisturbed, and visitors have unparalleled photography opportunities. From the safety of platforms built over world-famous Brooks Falls, we get a close angle on one of the world's most iconic wildlife spectacles: bears standing in the rushing whitewater, jaws gaping, trying to catch the salmon that leap up the falls once spawning season starts. July departures offer a good chance to see fishing bears, since this is when the salmon are running, but viewing is excellent in August, too, with even more (and fatter!) bears in the vicinity, wandering up and down the Brooks River in search of spawning salmon. Each day, we break for lunch at Brooks Lodge, an easy walk from the falls. In the evenings, shuttle back to King Salmon by floatplane or water taxi to spend the night enjoying "rustic luxury" at King Salmon Lodge.

Day 12: Bear Photography / Private Flight to Homer

We have one last chance this morning to seek photos of bears, admiring their majesty and whimsy alike. Few nature photographers have such an encounter with the raw beauty and profound silence of a landscape this size—these things alone would make for a life-transforming experience. But the chance to watch Alaskan brown bears, incomparable icons of the wild, on their turf, their terms...it's a wonder to have bears welcome us into their world. We depart as ambassadors for the bears, our time among them leaving an indelible mark on us, inspiring us to do all we can to protect them. After lunch, it's time to leave Bear Camp behind as we board our chartered bush plane to return to Homer, where we spend our final night at the tip of the spit. There may be time to stroll the beach, capture a few more trophy halibut photos at the harbor, or wander the shops and galleries nearby, before our farewell dinner in view of Kachemak Bay.

Day 13: Homer / Depart

Our Alaska photography adventure comes to a close today as we transfer to the Homer airport for departing flights.

Important Information About This Trip

This trip ventures far afield from the typical Alaska tour circuit where large motorcoaches move long lines of cruise clients to crowded destinations. A couple of details you should be aware of: Power is available at Denali Backcountry Lodge, Kenai Fjords Wilderness Lodge on Fox Island, and at Bear Camp or King Salmon Lodge.

A prime focus of our Alaska adventure is bears, which, naturally, should be treated with caution. At Brooks Falls and in Lake Clark National Park, thousands of visitors have traveled here to view bears over the past 50+ years and, to our knowledge, there has never been a bear attack. But we never know exactly what bears are thinking, so we ask our travelers to consider this and pay close attention to the rules set forth by the park rangers.

Mandatory Insurance

Since the areas we travel to are remote and wild (that's why we go there!), we require that all guests have, at minimum, medical evacuation insurance for this program. This is for the safety of all guests. We require that your chosen independent insurance plan includes at least \$250,000 in medical evacuation coverage.

To protect your investment and to provide peace of mind while you travel, we also strongly recommend purchasing comprehensive travel insurance. Plans may cover everything from medical treatment to trip cancellations and delays and lost luggage. Because weather in Alaska can be unpredictable—especially for travelers making same-day flight connections—we strongly recommend arriving in Fairbanks prior to Day 1 to allow a buffer for any delays. For guests who come in early, recommended hotels will be included in your pre-departure materials. If you plan to arrive on Day 1, please ensure your flight arrives by the required time.

You may depart from Homer at any time on the final day.
