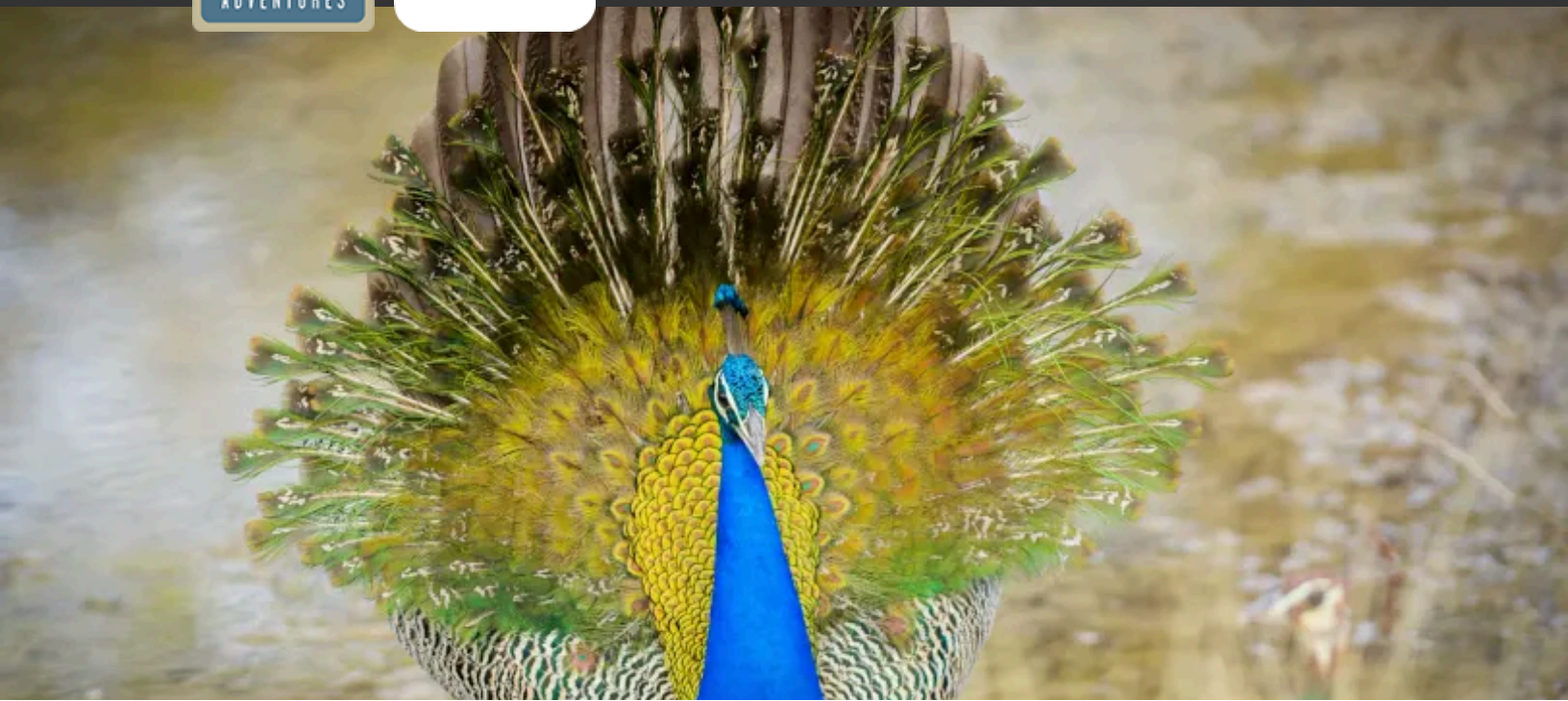

Arresting the gaze of a wild tiger is one of the most coveted images a nature photographer can pursue. And our India Tiger Photo Expedition offers the best possible odds to attain this rare achievement. In the tiger enclave of Tadoba National Park, when the Indian spring gives way to the hotter months of summer, animals anticipate the monsoon that is still weeks away. During the heat of the day, tigers seek shelter from the often-oppressive temperatures, but they must move into the open to drink, leaving the dry underbrush to reach water at least twice a day. With fewer visitors to India's tiger reserves in late spring and early summer, it is typically the best time of year to see and photograph wild animals, which may also include sloth bear, Indian civet, dhole (Indian wild dog), gaur, barking deer, honey badger, caracal, jackal, striped hyena, peacock and mongoose.

Trip Highlights

Visit Tadoba National Park at the best time of year for tiger sightings and unimpeded shots, as warmer weather draws tigers into the open in search of water

Along with tigers, seek images of other rare wildlife including sloth bear, dhole (Indian wild dog), gaur (Indian bison) and possibly leopard

Day 1: New Delhi, India / Delhi Photo Tour

Arrive in New Delhi and transfer to our luxury hotel in the leafy heart of Lutyens' Delhi, with its broad boulevards, historic homes and government enclaves. The district is named after British architect Edwin Lutyens, who was responsible for much of the architectural design and building during the period of the British Raj, when India was part of the British Empire from the 1920s to 1940s.



This afternoon, set out on a photographic odyssey through sprawling New Delhi. Our tour begins at Gurudwara Bangla Sahib, one of the country's most revered Sikh temples. We'll capture its luminous white architecture, reflections in the holy pool, and the movement of worshippers and volunteers in the bustling community kitchen that generously serves more than 10,000 free meals each day, cooked using donated ingredients from Sikh farmers. Continue to Agrasen ki Baoli, an ancient stepwell whose repeating arches and long descending staircase offer striking opportunities for geometric compositions, leading lines and studies of light and shadow. On a scenic drive through Lutyens' Delhi, photograph city icons as we pass the India Gate, the President of India's residence and the new Parliament building erected in 2023.

At the National Gandhi Museum, document excerpts from the life and principles of Mahatma Gandhi via a rich collection of original relics, books, journals and documents, photographs, audio-visual materials and other memorabilia closely connected with Gandhi and India's struggle for independence. If the museum is closed on a Monday, we will visit Humayun's Tomb instead, practicing wide-angle shots and close-ups of intricate carving detail at this 16th-century Mughal architectural masterpiece, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Return to our hotel with time to refresh before a welcome dinner this evening, plus an orientation by our Expedition Leader to all the India photography adventures that lie ahead.



Day 2: Photographing Delhi Old & New

India's capital offers a captivating introduction to the country and its cultures, in vivid counterpoint to the wild realms that lie ahead. There are two distinct sections of the city, ancient Old Delhi, and New Delhi, founded in 1911 by the British at the height of their empire. A half-day tour, timed to avoid the heat of midday, explores centuries of Old Delhi's complex, multi-layered history. A rickshaw ride provides a fitting overview, while a guided walk through the narrow lanes of bustling Chandni Chowk Market offers an array of opportunities to photograph the colorful, sensory display of everyday commerce.

Our local guide unveils the architectural treasure of Jama Masjid, one of India's largest mosques and the magnum opus of Mughal Emperor Shah Jahan. Completed in 1656 by more than 5,000 laborers, the grand edifice features alternating vertical strips of red sandstone and white marble, with a vast inner courtyard that can hold 25,000 people. We also visit Bangla Sahib, one of the country's most revered Sikh temples. The complex includes the main temple, a school, a sacred water tank and a large community kitchen that generously prepares over 10,000 free meals each day, known as langar, cooked by volunteers using donated ingredients from Sikh farmers. This evening, join our Expedition Leader for a welcome dinner and orientation to the tiger photography adventures that await.



Day 3: Fly to Nagpur / Tadoba National Park

From Delhi, fly south two hours to Nagpur, then transfer 2.5 hours by air-conditioned vehicles to Tadoba, the oldest and largest national park in Maharashtra state and one of India's 58 Project Tiger reserves. Tadoba has one of India's densest concentrations of Bengal tigers, offering excellent odds to capture photos of these mesmerizing felines, the largest of the world's wild cats. Tadoba also has a long conservation history. Once ruled by the Gond kings near the Chimur Hills, hunting in the area was banned in 1935. In 1955, 45 square miles of forest were designated as Tadoba National Park. The neighboring forests became Andhari Wildlife Sanctuary in 1986, and in 1995, both were merged to form the present-day Tadoba Andhari Tiger Reserve, spanning 241 square miles. At the reserve's southwestern edge lies Tadoba Lake, a vital water source and crocodile habitat that also serves as a buffer between the forest and surrounding farmland. Nearby Irai Lake attracts migratory ducks, geese and waders, making it a haven for birdwatchers.

On arrival, we check in at Waghoba Ecolodge, our luxurious base for the next six nights. Surrounded by traditional agricultural lands, forest and grasslands that are the domain of the Bengal tiger, we stay in utmost comfort with superb proximity to the park. With India's tiger numbers steadily on the rise, Tadoba offers an excellent opportunity to photograph them in the wild, especially during this dry time of year when vegetation is sparse and tigers more readily visible. The park is comprised of mixed grasslands and tropical dry deciduous forest, with teak and bamboo the predominant tree species. The terrain is hilly, with dense wooded areas and deep valleys providing plenty of shelter and seclusion for wild animals, including tigers. While tigers are always elusive, the odds of seeing this coveted species are high in Tadoba, especially at the time of year we visit.

This afternoon, join your Expedition Leader for a session on getting your camera ready for safari photography. Afterward, your guide will lead an optional walk around the property's natural environs for landscape photography at sunset.



Days 4 - 8: Photo Safaris in Tadoba National Park

Our twice-daily photo safaris take place in the early morning and late afternoon, when temperatures are relatively cooler, wildlife is more active, and light conditions are better for photography. We head out in 4x4 vehicles before sunrise each morning, eager for the day's discoveries. In contrast to an African safari where wildlife is often on display before us, India's animals take more effort to find. Tigers typically take shelter under the cover of trees and bushes, hiding from their prey and seeking relief from the heat. Because their stripes provide excellent camouflage, we have to work to locate them. But our Expedition Leaders are seasoned trackers, and we follow their lead, listening for sounds and watching for signs that may reveal a tiger's location: rustling grass, deer racing away from its presence, birds circling overhead. Fortunately, however, the time of year we are here ensures easier sightings: tigers must emerge from the jungle to drink water from Tadoba's lakes and the river that laces the park, and it's easier to see them in the open.

While tigers are our main subject goal, other wildlife is also plentiful. Sightings may include the shy sloth bear, dhole (Asiatic wild dog), gaur (Indian bison), striped hyena, jungle cat, Indian civet, sambar, spotted deer, barking deer and marsh crocodile. Leopards are also present, but rarely seen. Birdlife is prolific, and depending on where in the park we are, we may see peacock, gray-headed fish eagle, crested serpent eagle, gray heron, stork-billed kingfisher, cotton goose, many of Central India's native woodland bird species, and migratory birds that arrive here to spend the winter and spring.

The area around Tadoba also offers opportunities to photograph scenes of traditional rural life, and we are welcomed into the home of a local village family to learn about their culture and daily routines. We may also visit Ramdegi Temple, believed to be one of the spots where Rama, one of the most widely worshiped Hindu deities, stayed during his 14 years of exile. Local people believe that tigers can be seen boldly walking into the temple complex under the cover of night. The area around Ramdegi is also prime habitat for sloth bears, with a substantial population living in proximity. In the middle of each day, return to the comfort of our lodge to rest, relax, browse the nature library, or cool off in the swimming pool.

Day 9: Transfer to Delhi / Depart

Our tiger photo safari comes to a close today as we return via air-conditioned vehicles to Nagpur, then fly back to Delhi, where we meet departing flights or continue on our Agra Extension to photograph the Taj Mahal at sunrise and sunset, plus the stunning Red Fort.

Please Note: National parks in Central India close their core zones on Tuesdays and typically close entirely for Holi, which generally falls in March. If any portion of our visit to Tadoba coincides with a Tuesday closure, scheduled safaris will take place in the park's buffer zone, which is equally scenic and productive for wildlife viewing. If closures occur for Holi, alternate activities will be arranged in place of scheduled safari(s).

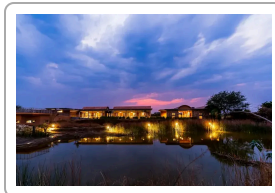

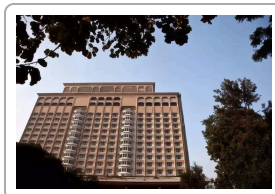

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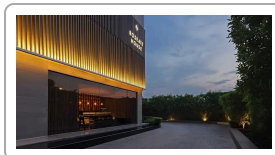

Tadoba National Park in Central India is legendary tiger country, and our tiger-intensive itinerary gives you 5-1/2 days on safari here, to maximize your chances of going home with the tiger images you dream of.

The Best Location, at the Best Time of Year, for Tiger Photography

Though it's hot when we visit, this increases our chances of seeing tigers, since they must emerge from shade and seclusion in the underbrush in order to drink water twice daily. Our best opportunity to photograph them will be at these lakes and waterholes. Other wildlife must also come out in search of water, and we're likely to have excellent chances to photograph a wide array of native species.

An Up-and-Coming Park with Fewer Crowds than More Famous Locations

While Tadoba National Park offers outstanding opportunities for tiger viewing, it isn't as packed with visitors as India's best-known tiger parks. Here, you'll get to watch wildlife in relative peace and solitude, without hordes of Jeeps at every sighting. No radio or mobile phone use is allowed between vehicles and visitors in this park, meaning you are less likely to share your experience with dozens of other visitors. Only traditional "word of mouth" methods are permitted for sharing sightings, as drivers and guides pass one another driving through the park.

Six Guests Total—Just Two Photographers Per Safari Vehicle

You won't find a smaller group! Our trip is capped at six guests. And with just two travelers, a driver, guide, and a park ranger in our open-sided safari vehicles, you'll have a quiet presence and unimpeded access for photography. There's also room to carry all your gear comfortably, and flexibility to adapt to changing conditions (light, weather, animal movements) in order to maximize photo opportunities.

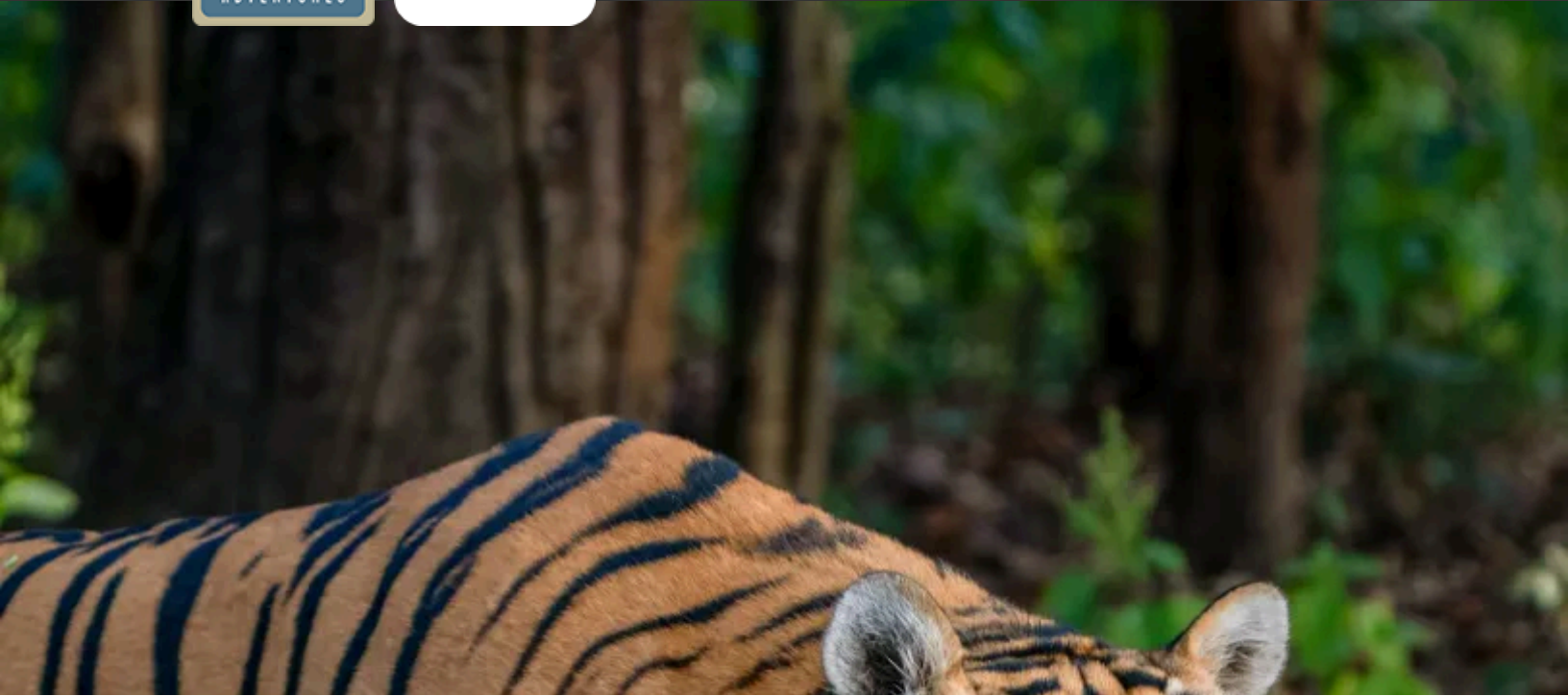

Important Information About This Trip

Wildlife Encounters

Most of our guests travel to India to encounter the country's wildlife. While nature experiences in India are indeed outstanding, there is a fundamental difference between a safari in the Indian jungle and a typical African safari. At times, guests lured to India by tourist brochures promising "tiger safaris" can be disappointed to see fewer animals than they expected, or at least fewer than they might normally expect to see in Africa. It is not that India's surviving jungle habitat is sparsely populated with wildlife, but, similarly to places like Costa Rica where the forest vegetation is very dense, animals have mastered the art of camouflage and can be difficult to spot, even during the summer season when foliage is thinner.

That said, we have carefully designed our India itineraries to capitalize on the best conditions to spot tigers. We don't think you'll find a better opportunity to maximize your chance to view and photograph tigers than this trip affords. But various factors can affect potential sightings, including inclement weather, which creates small pockets of water that allow the animals to remain hidden in the forest, rather than being forced into the open to frequent waterholes. The secret to a successful Indian nature adventure lies with the expertise of our Expedition Leaders and park rangers, as well as your knowing what to expect as a traveler, and in understanding that the privilege of stepping into a wild and untouched natural realm is a reward in itself.

Safari Vehicle Routes & Seating Allocation

Tadoba National Park is divided into two primary zones: the Core Zone and the Buffer Zone. Each day, the park limits the number of permits issued for both zones to ensure sustainable wildlife tourism and minimal disruption to the ecosystem. While the Core Zone may be considered the prime area for tiger sightings due to its denser tiger population, the Buffer Zone also offers a unique and rewarding safari experience with diverse landscapes, abundant wildlife, and strong opportunities for tiger sightings.

Guests can expect a balanced mix of safaris in both zones, each offering its own distinct appeal. Within the zone we are assigned each day, we will have access to all roads and areas, ensuring a comprehensive experience. We understand that the main purpose of your journey is to view tigers, but please understand that there is a chance that the vehicle to which you are assigned could take the same zone multiple times. Thank you for participating in this adventure knowing that this may be the case.

Indian park regulations are also extremely strict with regard to seating arrangements on wildlife drives. Requirements dictate that guests be confirmed in specific vehicles upon booking, well in advance of the departure date, and we are unable to change vehicles while we are exploring each park.

It is also important to understand the limitations based on available vehicle space. Each open safari vehicle has two front seats and two rows of bench seats. Regulations require that the front two seats be occupied by a park ranger and registered driver. Our Expedition Leader and local guides are allowed more flexibility and will switch among vehicles for each drive so that all guests are able to spend equal time with them. This means that as our Expedition Leaders and local guides rotate vehicles, there may be times when there will be two people (one guest and one Expedition Leader or local guide) to a row.

Also, on rare occasions, you may see film crews during your time inside the park. These crews have special permits to film inside park boundaries and, as a result, they do enjoy certain advantages that a regular tourist does not, such as spending the entire day inside the park and having access to places where others cannot go. Please know that while there are indeed limiting factors to the tiger-viewing experience in India, we have taken great pains to ensure that this special India tiger safari provides the very best viewing and photography opportunities possible.

Cell Phone Ban in Tadoba National Park

Tadoba National Park has a strict ban on the use of cell phones by all visitors, guides and drivers within the park's Core Zone, with no exceptions. Guides and drivers are allowed limited use of phones (no calls) within the Buffer



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Zone. Guests are not allowed to use cell phones for any purpose, including photography and taking videos, anywhere within the park. This ban originated to combat the use of location tags by poachers to track tigers. It also supports traditional tiger tracking methods through word of mouth, which minimizes the number of vehicles at sightings. Tiger sightings take on a whole new level of intimacy when cellphones are set aside, ensuring a more respectful and less intrusive experience for both humans and wildlife.

To facilitate photography in the park, Nat Hab has developed an exclusive program with Lensrentals, a premier lens rental company, which allows our travelers to rent high-quality cameras, lenses, spotting scopes, tripods, flashes, backpacks and other equipment at a 15% discount. Mandatory Insurance

Since the areas we travel to are remote and wild (that's why we go there!), we require that all guests have, at minimum, medical evacuation insurance for this program. This is for the safety of all guests. We require that your chosen independent insurance plan includes at least \$250,000 in medical evacuation coverage.

To protect your investment and to provide peace of mind while you travel, we also strongly recommend purchasing comprehensive travel insurance. Plans may cover everything from medical treatment to trip cancellations and delays and lost luggage. Getting There & Getting Home

This trip begins and ends in Delhi. Because this is a long international journey with considerable travel time and time-zone adjustment, **we recommend that you arrive the night before Day 1** to rest from your travels and begin the trip refreshed. For guests who come in early, our recommended hotel will be included in your pre-departure materials.

If you plan to arrive on Day 1, you may arrive in Delhi at any time, as there are no scheduled activities until Day 2; Day 1 dinner is at your leisure.

You may depart Delhi any time after 9 pm on the final day.

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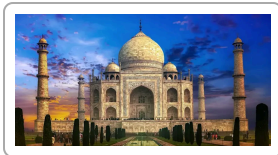
