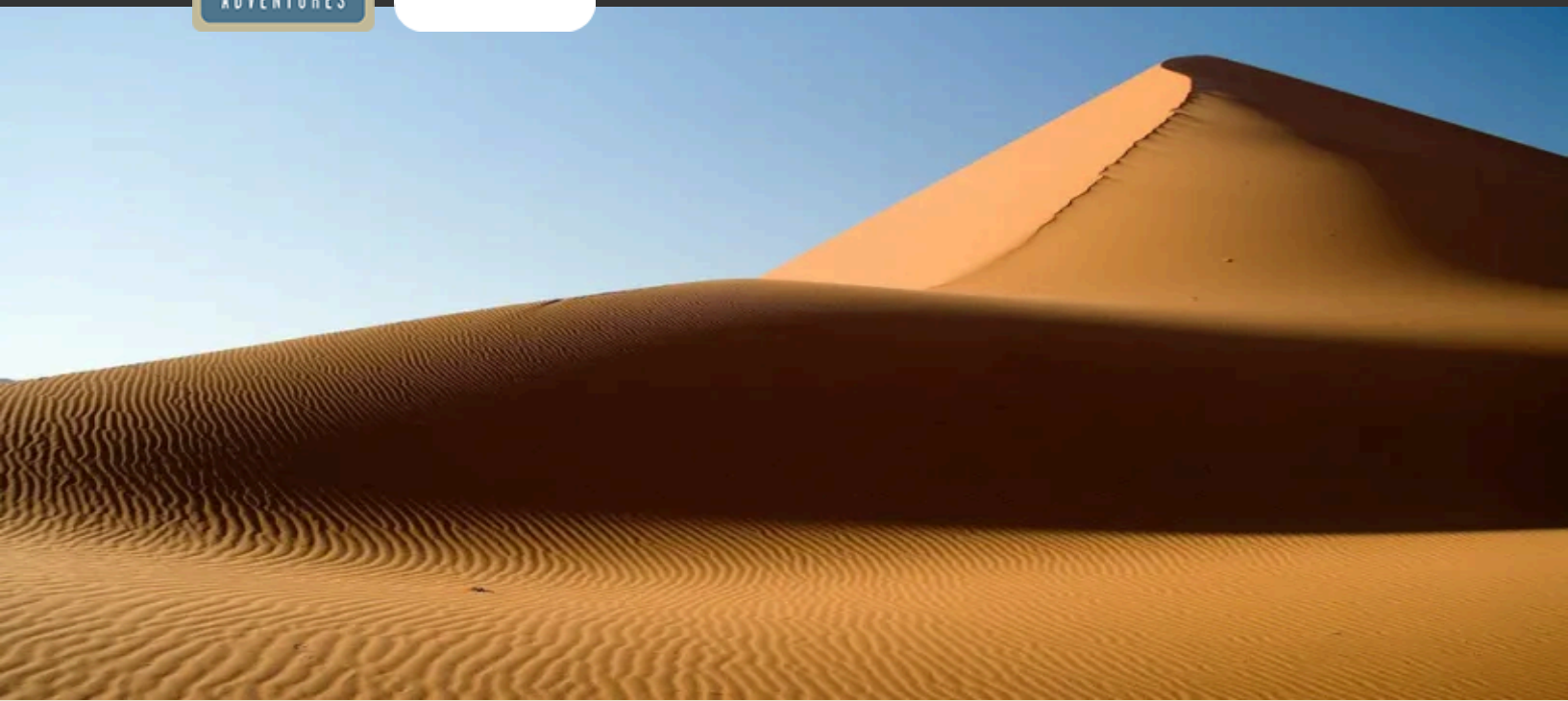

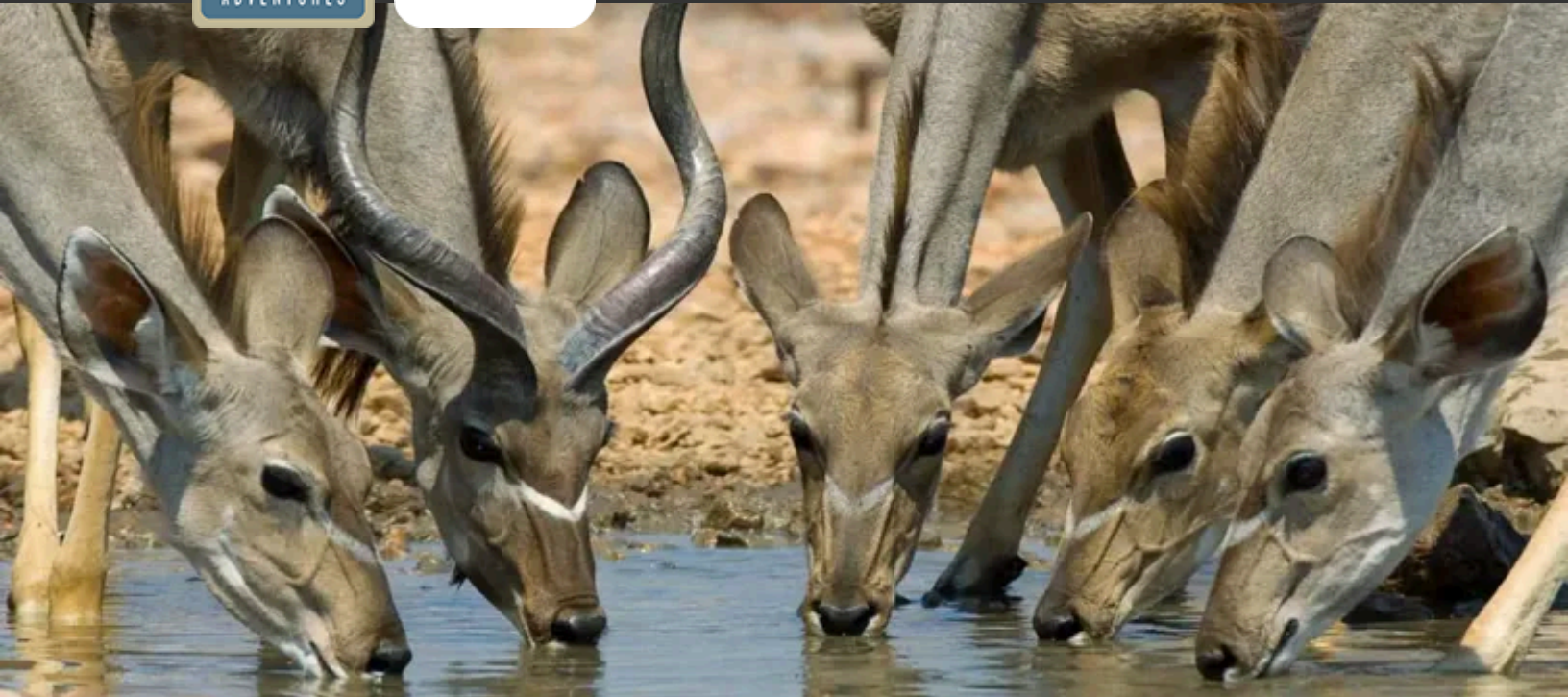

Photograph Namibia’s Unique Desert Wildlife & Stunning Landscapes in Remote Seclusion

Namibia is one of Africa’s best-kept secrets for photographers. Less well known and less visited than the game parks of East and South Africa, Namibia’s treasures remain more hidden, revealed to those in search of a truly distinctive safari adventure. Here amid one of the world’s greatest deserts, we find a surprising collection of hardy wildlife that has managed to adapt to its harsh environs. Yet this is also an arrestingly beautiful land. From soaring sand dunes to broad, dry rivers, from jumbled rocky mountains to lonely beaches, photographers will find Namibia profoundly alluring. A more civilized highlight is our luxury camps, replete with amenities and enveloped by silent wilderness.

With guidance from our Expedition Leader, photograph desert-adapted wildlife, including elephants, against the varied backdrop of Namibia’s striking topography

Day 1: Windhoek, Namibia

Our Namibia photo safari begins in Windhoek, the country's contemporary capital whose eclectic skyline is peppered with German castles, glass skyscrapers and cathedral spires. We meet our Expedition Leader on arrival and settle in to our boutique hotel in one of Windhoek's leafy and tranquil neighborhoods. Over a leisurely welcome dinner, get acquainted with fellow travelers and learn about the vast landscapes and wildlife we'll be photographing during an orientation overview.





Days 2 - 4: Kulala Private Reserve—Sossusvlei Sand Dunes

After breakfast, a mid-morning flight by light aircraft lands us at Little Kulala, a luxury desert retreat within the private 90,000-acre Kulala Wilderness Reserve at the edge of Namibia's great sand sea. The word *namib* in the Nama language means "vast," an apt name for this ancient arid expanse—the world's oldest desert. From this profoundly secluded vantage point, we'll have a chance to photograph some of Africa's most arresting vistas, including vermilion sunsets and black skies glittering with stars.

Rise early each morning on dawn excursions to Sossusvlei, Namibia's most legendary landscape. This flat salt and clay pan surrounded by Earth's tallest sand dunes will entrance nature photographers, as the changing light continually alters the dramatic scene before us. Wildlife drives take us into the shape-shifting, ochre-colored dunes at the Namib Desert's lonely center. Framed by intense blue skies, the dunes change color as the morning sun rises higher in the sky, shifting from deep red to burnished orange, then ochre and gold as the sun ascends. Inside are diamonds, tucked into the sand mountains by currents, waves and wind.

While wildlife is sparsely distributed in this austere landscape, we have a chance to capture photos of desert species including oryx, ostrich, springbok, spotted and brown hyena, aardwolf and bat-eared fox. The rare dune lark's entire range is confined to this habitat. Discover the desert's subtle magic on short walks and safari drives—plus there is an optional opportunity for an early-morning hot air balloon flight over the dunes, a thrilling chance for photographers to capture dramatic aerial views of this wondrous landscape in the rosy glow of sunrise.

Days 5 - 7: Palmwag Concession—Skeleton Coast

Fly north toward Namibia's Skeleton Coast, whose evocative name references the dried bones of wrecked ships that lay half-buried on beaches battered by fierce Atlantic storms. Our destination, Hoanib Skeleton Coast, is a hospitable outpost amid one of Africa's last great wildernesses. Set in one of the most fragile ecosystems on Earth, the low-impact camp enjoys a scenic location at the confluence of two tributaries of the dry Hoanib River in the northern part of the private million-acre Palmwag Concession, next to Skeleton Coast National Park. Few safari locales offer the level of isolation found here in one of the most remote regions of the Kaokoveld.

We spend three days immersed in these rugged mountains, vast plains, dune fields and dry riverbeds, with one excursion to the coast itself. A range of activities is designed to maximize photography opportunities, and we explore via 4x4 drives and hides for wildlife viewing. Our bewitching environs are inhabited by a remarkable array of desert-adapted plants and animals, with surprising photo subjects at every turn. Almost miraculously, a multitude of species thrives in the stark inland environment, including Namibia's largest population of desert elephant. With cameras poised, we hope for sightings of giraffe and lion, oryx, springbok and steenbok. On a guided bush walk (safety permitting), look for scrub hare and inquisitive ground squirrels. During our stay we have one opportunity to visit the Skeleton Coast, driving out and flying back (weather permitting; coastal fog is a regular presence here). A colony of Cape fur seals is often present on shore, and we may spot black-backed jackal and elusive brown hyena near the beach. Birdlife is diverse, with many southern African endemics, and we're likely to spot jaegers and skuas.



Days 8 - 10: Ongava Private Reserve—Etosha National Park

Transfer by light aircraft to the Ongava Reserve on the border of Etosha National Park. The Etosha Salt Pan is the remnant of a huge lake that existed here two million years ago. Bare and dry today, the depression offers Namibia's best wildlife photography opportunities, with elephant, black and white rhino, lion, leopard, cheetah, giraffe, zebra, wildebeest, hartebeest, springbok, oryx, kudu and the diminutive dik-dik drawn to its life-sustaining waterholes. Birdlife is abundant, and we may see ostrich and raptors. We stay on the private reserve adjacent to the park, far from any other accommodations. From camp we take guided walks (safety permitting) and night drives on the reserve, venturing into the park by day to photograph wildlife and scenery.

Day 11: Windhoek / Depart

Our grand Namibia photo safari concludes today as we fly from Ongava back to Windhoek to connect with flights onward.

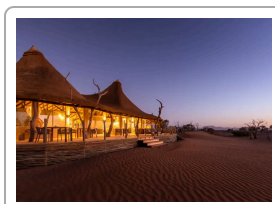

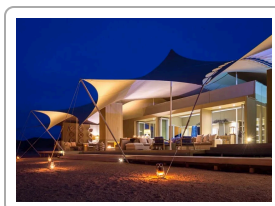
Olive Grove Guest House

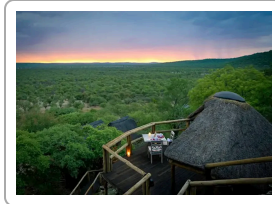


Hoanib Skeleton Coast Camp

While Namibia's tarmac road system in developed areas encourages a more "bus-like" safari approach, we limit our groups to just eight guests, with *only four travelers per vehicle*, facilitating access to remote areas that mini buses can't get to...as well as a more personalized safari experience with limited impact on fragile environments.
- 2 Chartered Flights for More Time on Safari**

We arrange light aircraft transfers to maximize your time on safari with wildlife, rather than negotiating rough and dusty roads between destinations. Furthermore, from the air, you'll gain a whole different scenic perspective on Namibia's vast and dramatic landscapes.
- 3 Private Reserves Offer Seclusion & Special Activities**

Private reserves are essential to an optimal Namibia safari. From the remote and rarely visited Skeleton Coast to the Ongava and Kulala wilderness reserves (both are private concessions adjacent to national parks), we are able to explore in solitude and view an abundance of wildlife without the presence of other visitors. When we do visit the national parks, we can quickly enter prime wildlife-viewing areas and return to our private enclaves for a much quieter and more remote experience. We also enjoy exclusive activities not permitted in the national parks, such as safari walks, a wildlife hide and night drives in search of nocturnal animals.
- 4 Exclusive Opportunities to Explore on Foot**

Guided bush walks are available on private reserves—rare opportunities to stretch your legs while on safari. An optional climb up the sand dunes at Sossusvlei offers for a whole different perspective on this dramatic landscape that most safari-goers confined to vehicles miss.
- 5 Two Sunrise Excursions to Photograph the Sossusvlei Dunes**

Most Namibia safaris spend just one day at the magnificent dunes of Sossusvlei, the tallest sand dunes in the world. We have built in two full excursions here, for double the opportunity to photograph this iconic landscape by the day's first, best light.

A Rare Visit to the Skeleton Coast

Few Namibia safaris include this exceptionally wild and remote destination, one of the longest, loneliest and wildest stretches of ocean coastline on Earth. From Hoanib Skeleton Coast camp, we have unusual access to this region, with multiple possibilities (weather permitting, since fog frequently is present here) to photograph wildlife, including large colonies of Cape fur seals, jackals and hyenas that roam the shore; misty dunes that front the beach; and shipwrecks and relics left behind by ill-fated crews.

Important Information About This Trip

This photo adventure encompasses the magic of Namibia's vast and varied landscape, from the world's tallest sand dunes to the stark Skeleton Coast to wildlife-rich Etosha National Park, without having to make long, hot, dusty drives that have traditionally been a part of a Namibia safari. A major benefit of this flight-based photo safari are the unbelievable views from the air. Towering dunes, endless desert and rocky coastlines reveal Namibia's natural diversity. Also by flying, we maximize our time on safari, rather than in transit. While the scenery—and the entire experience—is tremendous, the animal encounters in Namibia tend to be somewhat less plentiful than in some other safari destinations, though the Etosha portion is fantastic for wildlife.

Mandatory Insurance

Since the areas we travel to on this trip are remote and wild (that's why we go there!), we require medical evacuation insurance for our guests' safety. If you decline the medical evacuation insurance coverage offered by Natural Habitat, we request that you send us documentation of the independent coverage you have selected. We will add the cost of a medical evacuation policy to your tour invoice until you provide our office with proof of coverage including your insurance company's name, contact number and your individual policy number. Thank you for understanding that our policy exists exclusively in the interest of our guests' safety.



Getting There & Getting Home

This trip begins and ends in Windhoek, Namibia. Because this is a long international journey, **we recommend that you arrive at least one night prior to Day 1** to rest from your travels and begin the trip refreshed. For guests who come in early, recommended hotels will be included in your pre-departure materials. You must arrive in Windhoek by 5 pm on Day 1 in order to join the group for the first scheduled activities

You may depart Windhoek anytime after 1:20 pm on the final day.

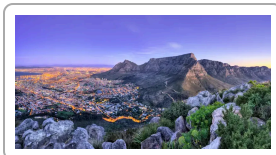

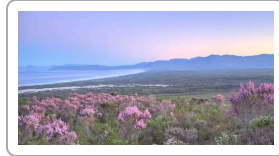
