Relish unparalleled proximity to polar bears, in total seclusion—then add two nights in historic Churchill to enjoy cultural activities and a chance to meet the hardy locals who call this subarctic outpost home. Search for polar bears, Arctic fox, Arctic hare and ptarmigan during Polar Rover excursions on the tundra, enjoy close-up bear viewing from the Tundra Lodge, learn about Churchill's colorful past on a tour of the town, and fly through the forest on an exhilarating dog sled ride behind a team of working huskies. This multifaceted northern adventure truly does it all!

Trip Highlights

Spend two nights at the famous Tundra Lodge, set near the shore of Hudson Bay where polar bear density is highest—then return to the hub of activity in Churchill

Explore the frontier town and environs of Churchill, once a Hudson's Bay Company fur trading post, and go dog sledding with a renowned local musher

From the Tundra Lodge, head out to look for polar bears and other wildlife from our custom Polar Rovers, designed to facilitate the closest possible encounters

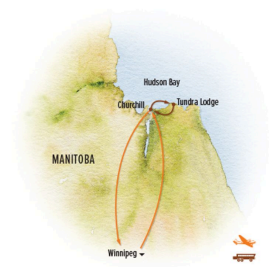

Ultimate Churchill: Tundra Lodge & Town Itinerary

Stay Among the Bears on the Tundra & in the Northern Frontier Town of Churchill

Day 1: Winnipeg, Manitoba

Arrive in Winnipeg and transfer to the historic Fort Garry Hotel. Built in 1913 by the Canadian Pacific Railway, this prestigious landmark has long been a symbol of genteel elegance in the heart of Manitoba's capital, which was once a fur-trading post and railway boomtown and today is the cultural and commercial center of Canada's eastern prairie region. Once you arrive, visit our gear room in the hotel to pick up your heavy Arctic parka and winter boots to use while you are in Churchill. This evening, gather for a welcome dinner with our Expedition Leader.





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Day 2: Winnipeg / Private Chartered Flight to Churchill / Tundra Lodge

Fly on our private chartered aircraft to Churchill this morning, where we board a custom-designed Polar Rover vehicle for our transfer to the Tundra Lodge. As we drive out of town, watch for Arctic wildlife against the vast, wide-open landscape—we may even get our first polar bear photos en route. Once we reach our hospitable outpost on the tundra, get settled in to spend the next two nights surrounded by the vast expanse of treeless plain on the edge of Hudson Bay. Then it's time to gather for a presentation on polar bears by one of our naturalist Expedition Leaders. Our guides are experts on the natural history of the Canadian Arctic, and you're sure to learn a lot during this enlightening introduction to our northern adventure. Later, as dinner is served in the Tundra Lodge dining room, keep your camera at the ready—we often see polar bears wandering right outside the windows!

Day 3: Tundra Lodge—Polar Bear Viewing

Accommodating just 29 guests, the Tundra Lodge is strategically positioned near the edge of Hudson Bay in the best area for polar bear viewing. Inquisitive bears often approach the lodge, which features rows of windows and safely elevated outdoor observation decks to accommodate our own curiosity. As we watch the bears interact, we're delighted by their antics and rugged beauty. We may see protective mothers with cubs, young males play-fighting, and solitary individuals patrolling the tundra as they wait for the ice to form on Hudson Bay, signaling the start of their winter seal-hunting season.

The unique location of the Tundra Lodge, combined with excursions in our all-terrain Polar Rover vehicles, offers lodge guests the best possible wildlife encounters in the region. The small spit of land where the lodge is situated near the bay often attracts the greatest number of bears in the area. We typically divide up for activities so each traveler enjoys a half-day excursion on the tundra, complemented by a half-day of viewing bears from the lodge. In addition to polar bears, we may also spot caribou, Arctic fox, Arctic hare, snowy owl and ptarmigan. At the end of an exhilarating day, gather inside our cozy accommodation for dinner and a naturalist presentation. And if we are fortunate to have a rare clear autumn night, we might even see the northern lights after dark.

Day 4: Polar Bear Viewing / Churchill

Depart the Tundra Lodge after breakfast and head back out to the tundra for a final full day immersed of nature and wildlife observation. Traveling aboard our Polar Rover, scout for polar bears and other Arctic species. Our vehicles are the newest and best in Churchill, with huge windows, a slanted front windshield that allows us to look down on bears that may wander in front of the vehicle, and a steel-grate outdoor observation deck on the back—bears sometimes wander directly below, and through the mesh we can safely view them just inches away! Our heated vehicles are spacious and comfortable, and while they can accommodate 30-plus passengers, we hold our numbers to 16 or fewer, so everyone has a window seat and plenty of room to spread out for photography. Later this afternoon, we drive back to Churchill and check in to our hotel. We'll have dinner at a restaurant in town, followed by an evening cultural presentation.



Day 5: Exploring Historic Churchill & Environs

This remote subarctic hamlet of Churchill, with a population of fewer than 900, is accessible only by air or rail. We have a full day to explore its Indigenous heritage, frontier history and contemporary life on a comprehensive tour of this northern outpost and surroundings. Located on the southwest coast of Hudson Bay, Churchill is the hub of a region that has been frequented by humans for at least 4,000 years. Archaeological evidence supports the presence of semi-nomadic Pre-Dorset and Dorset cultures using the area as a seasonal hunting ground, sustained by caribou in summer and ringed seals in winter. The Thule culture, which arrived around 1000 AD, are the ancestors of today's Inuit. Long before Europeans arrived, the Cree, Dene and Inuit had well-established trading networks in the area. Their descendants live on in modern-day Churchill, and we have special opportunities to meet and hear from elders who sustain vital traditions.

Henry Hudson was the first European to explore the bay that bears his name, arriving by ship in 1610 in search of the Northwest Passage. Later, in 1670, the Hudson's Bay Company was established, the oldest commercial corporation in the world. It established a fur trading post at the mouth of the Churchill River, which grew in importance when Fort Churchill was built on the site in 1717, with Fort Prince of Wales following in 1731. In the 1920s, the latter became part of Parks Canada, recognizing its important status in the development of the region and putting resources toward its reconstruction in the 1930s, when the opening of the railroad allowed access to materials and heavy equipment to rebuild it. Today, the fort is a National Historic Site, which we pass during tour.

Our adventure continues outside town as we drive the rugged roads over the tundra, scanning the windswept plain and boreal forest edge for Arctic wildlife. With luck, we may spot polar bears ambling along the rocky coastline or resting on the tidal flats, patiently waiting for the sea ice to form and hunting season to begin. We also have good chances to see Arctic fox, Arctic hare, and a variety of birds, including snowy white ptarmigan. Back in town, take time to wander the few blocks that make up Churchill's compact core. Browse local shops selling handmade northern crafts, Indigenous artwork and distinctive souvenirs that embody the spirit and resilience of life on the edge of the Arctic. We then gather for dinner on our final night in Churchill.

Day 6: Dog Sledding / Private Chartered Flight to Winnipeg

This morning we learn about and experience a distinctly northern pastime: dog sledding. On a visit with a local Metis musher who has been a significant force in furthering the Indigenous heritage of using sled dogs in the Arctic, hear all about this traditional means of northern transportation, interacting with the lively dog team as we learn about their care and training. Then we take turns enjoying an exhilarating ride as the dogs whisk us down a trail through the boreal forest.

Depending on flight schedules, there may be time for an optional helicopter tour over the tundra—a great chance to spy polar bears from the air. We enjoy a final lunch together in Churchill before our return chartered flight to Winnipeg, followed by a farewell dinner and final night at the Fort Garry Hotel.



Day 7: Winnipeg / Depart

After breakfast, transfer to the airport for flights home.

Please note: *Itineraries may vary slightly and activities may happen at times different from what is listed, but inclusions are the same.*

An important note on polar bear viewing: *Since 1989, we have run approximately 1,500 departures to Churchill to view polar bears, and we've missed seeing them on just a handful of occasions. Some of our sightings are up close, and others are from afar, or even from a helicopter. It's important to remember that while there is no better opportunity to see polar bears in the wild than our Churchill trips offer, the experience is weather-dependent. That means viewing polar bears—and the distance at which we may see them—is unpredictable and not guaranteed.*

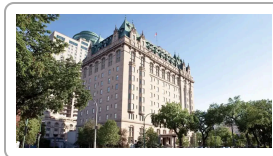

Our exclusive **Tundra Lodge**, which offers access to polar bear terrain around the clock, is the most exciting way to immerse yourself in the King of the Arctic's realm. Many travelers to Churchill also find this frontier town a highlight in itself. And this novel itinerary brings both experiences together: Stay in wild polar bear habitat at the Tundra Lodge, positioned each season for secluded proximity to bears—then add two nights in Churchill to experience the culture of the Canadian North. Here's what you can expect from this unique itinerary:

1 The Best Polar Bear Viewing Spot on the Planet!

Our Tundra Lodge, private for Nat Hab guests alone, is strategically placed on a small spit of land that juts into Hudson Bay. This is where the sea ice first begins to form, attracting polar bears at the start of the bear-viewing season. The Tundra Lodge is set amid the highest polar bear density in the world.

2 Private Cabins & Spacious Viewing Areas for Bear Observation

You won't find a more comfortable way to spend leisurely time watching polar bears than from the Tundra Lodge. Aboard this unique hotel with accommodations fashioned after train sleeper cars, each guest has an individual cabin with sleeping berth and a window for private bear observation. The lounge also features large windows so you'll never miss any action.

3 Outdoor Viewing Platforms Facilitate Safe Close Encounters

Watch bears in the open air from outdoor viewing platforms with see-through steel-mesh decking—bears sometimes wander directly beneath! These platforms provide a safe alternative for outdoor viewing since we can't walk on the ground among the bears.

4 Exclusive Permits for the Best Bear-Viewing Area

Not every polar tour operator holds permits to access the entire Churchill Wildlife Management Area (WMA) where the best—and sometimes only— occurs. Of course, the Nat Hab/Great White Bear team possesses such a permit. Other operators are confined to the paved and gravel road to Halfway Point—which, as the name suggests, is only halfway to the prime polar bear area. If you're coming to Churchill to see polar bears, be sure you get the full experience.

5 Travel with Two Naturalist Expedition Leaders

Our custom-built Polar Rovers have an advanced drive train that allows us to safely traverse the tundra with virtually no chance of breakdown, plus a custom-designed heavy-duty suspension system that evens out the ride over rugged terrain. And, with onboard flush toilets, our guests enjoy a superior level of comfort.

7 Steel Mesh Decking Facilitates Close-Up Polar Bear Viewing

Built into the rear viewing platform of every Polar Rover—and into the platforms that separate the individual "cars" of the Tundra Lodge—is a pioneering feature that greatly enhances our opportunities to watch polar bears up close: corrugated steel-mesh floors, allowing close proximity to curious bears that sometimes walk underneath the platforms!

8 The Smallest Groups for a Superior Nature Adventure

While it may cost us more to offer, the benefits of a small group are well worth it. Inside the Tundra Lodge, which accommodates 29 guests, there's plenty of room to view bears through sliding windows and from the spacious deck. And while our Polar Rovers can hold 30-plus passengers, we generally travel with just 15 per vehicle on excursions from the Tundra Lodge. Every guest has plenty of space to spread out, angle for photos, and enjoy watching polar bears without being bumped by other travelers.

9 Private Chartered Flights Maximize Our Time with the Bears

To achieve the most time with polar bears, rather than making you wait around airports and endure the hassle of security screenings, we charter our own aircraft to take us directly from Winnipeg to Churchill at a time that works best for our itinerary.

No need to go spend a lot of money buying heavy outdoor gear you may use just once—we provide Arctic-style parkas and heavy-duty winter boots for your use in Churchill, at no cost.

Important Information About This Trip

A stay at our exclusive Tundra Lodge offers guests the true feel of the Far North, with polar bears ambling across the tundra right outside the windows. Despite its isolation, the facility is remarkably comfortable, with private bedrooms and a common lounge. The onboard kitchen staff prepares delectable meals served in the spacious dining room. The specialized Polar Rover vehicle located on site provides transportation for half-day excursions over the tundra. Each Tundra Lodge guest will travel on the Polar Rover for one half-day excursion each day; the second half of each day is spent viewing the bears from the comfort of the Tundra Lodge. As the bears approach us, we are able to observe their interactions in the natural environment surrounding the lodge. An important feature of our polar bear trips is the limited group size. Nature is always best experienced in smaller groups, a particularly important element of this trip.

On this unique combination itinerary, we will depart the Tundra Lodge on Day 4 and travel into the town of Churchill to spend two nights, for a chance to experience the culture of this rugged and remote frontier town (sometimes this itinerary will run in reverse). Our polar bear viewing opportunities continue even after we depart the Tundra Lodge, when we return to the tundra from town for an additional full-day Polar Rover excursion on Day 5. Please note that at times, this itinerary may run in reverse with two nights in town, followed by two nights on the Tundra Lodge.

Regarding polar bears in general: Polar bears are typically in the Churchill area year-round, though the highest concentration occurs in October and November, as the bears congregate along Hudson Bay waiting for the ice to freeze. Sometimes the best bear viewing happens in the beginning of the season, sometimes it's in the middle, and sometimes at the end—we never know for sure. Once the bay freezes, many of the bears depart. Historically, this typically happens in early December, but an unusually early cold spell can occur to hasten their departure.

Meals

Please understand that the meals in Churchill are specially planned and prepared for well in advance. With ample notice, dietary requirements due to serious medical conditions or strict personal restrictions can be met, but must be adhered to while on the adventure. If you have a very restricted diet, we recommend bringing some of your preferred snacks along with the appreciation that certain foods are limited in this part of the world.

Mandatory Insurance

Since the areas we travel to are remote and wild (that's why we go there!), we require that all guests have, at minimum, medical evacuation insurance for this program. This is for the safety of all guests. We require that your chosen independent insurance plan includes at least \$250,000 in medical evacuation coverage.

To protect your investment and to provide peace of mind while you travel, we also strongly recommend purchasing comprehensive travel insurance. Plans may cover everything from medical treatment to trip cancellations and delays and lost luggage. Getting There & Getting Home

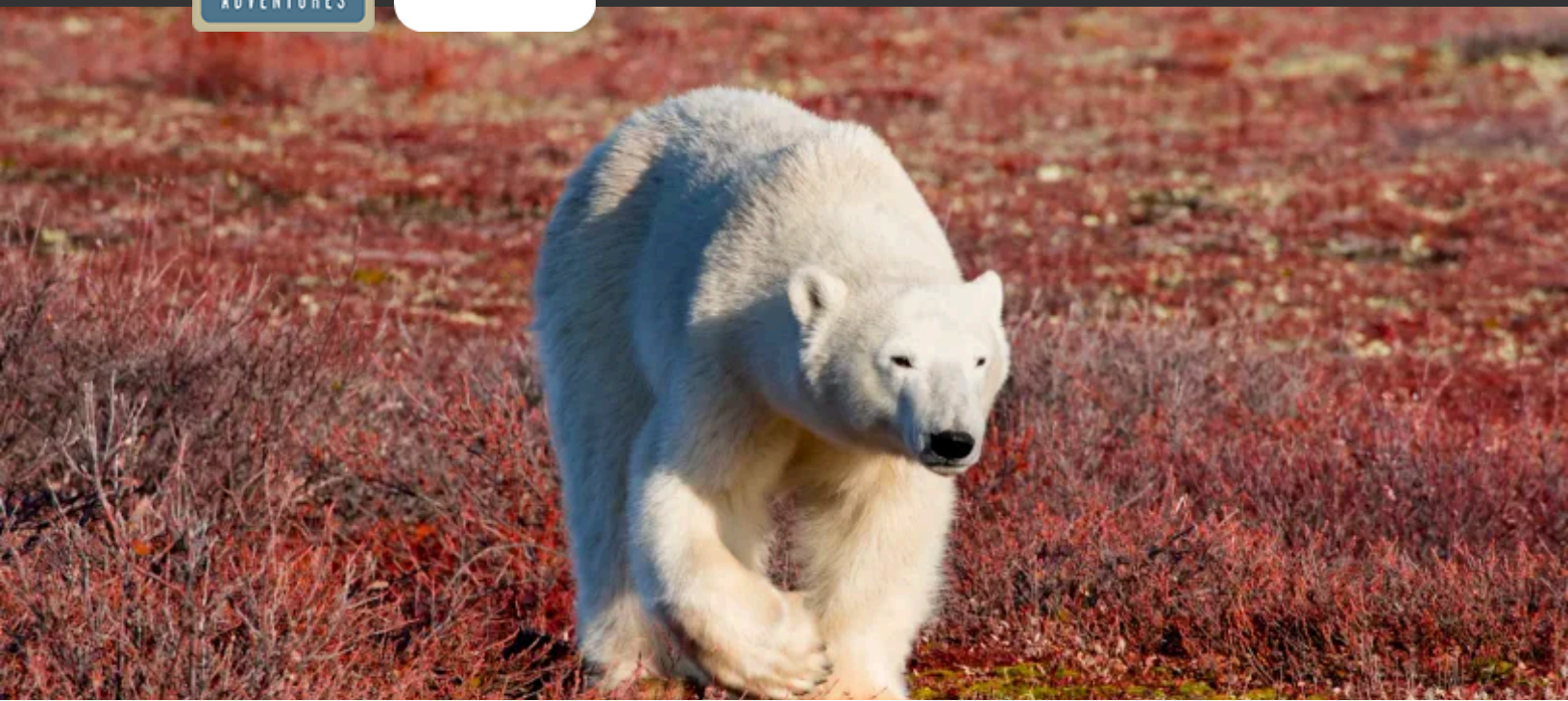
This trip begins and ends in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Because weather delays are possible, **we recommend that you arrive at least one night prior to Day 1** to rest from your travels and begin the trip refreshed. For guests who come in early, recommended hotels will be included in your pre-departure materials. If you plan to arrive on Day 1, you must arrive in Winnipeg by 5 pm in order to attend the 7 pm orientation dinner.
